Please pray for the recent hurricane victims. As you know we have had a relatively minor hurricane within our district. Our Disaster Aide team along with many volunteers immediate sprung into action and supported the needs of the communities affected. When we took a breath Hurricane Helene hit Florida and continued spreading death and destruction all the way to Virgina. Once again, our very own Larry Agee and his teams of Disaster Aide deployed to Florida and will remain there for several months. The district foundation has a special donation account just to support the efforts of disaster relief. Please consider supporting.

33 Clubs visited only 16 to go. Clara and I can't thank you enough for the warm welcomes and support provided. We are thoroughly enjoying our visits with every club and Rotarian. We are at the point now where we're starting to see some time on our calendar to be able to support your local projects. Just today, we observed the Opelousas Sunrise club fund raiser of selling Sausage Poboys to support their "Love Fest Project". This weekend we will be with the Golden Meadow and Grand Isle Clubs for their Shrimp Cookoff Festival Fund Raiser. Invite us to your events. We'll make as many as we can.

October 24th is World Polio Eradication Day. As we keep saying, "we are so close". At this point in time, we have 50 cases from wild polio virus. Only 2 countries remain and due to the nature of these countries it is extremely difficult to reach every child. As you may know we recently had 5 health women workers killed while working in Afghanistan. Our President Stephanie Urchick took an incredibly courageous step to travel to Afghanistan to meet with the leaders of the country and the Taliban. Along with WHO and UNESCO she was able to get the Taliban leadership to allow our workers to do their job. Additionally, I'm sure you heard that a new wild polio case was discovered in Gaza. Our system was able to identify the individual and trace the exact location and methodology by which the boy contracted the disease. 640 thousand doses of vaccine were immediately shipped to the region to ensure no further cases. We must keep pressing until we finish the job. I might note here that, if you're not aware that it is called Polio Plus because we're not just vaccinating against Polio, but as we install the health systems in place to support Polio eradication we are using the system for many other health benefits such as other vaccines. COVID is a prime example. Using the same systems in place throughout the world the COVID Vaccine was distributed. Rotarians can be very proud of this. Please take this month to conduct projects to raise awareness and funds for Polio Eradication. We still get a two to one match by the Gates Foundation. For every dollar you donate he donates two. Our goal is every club donates \$1500 to the Polio Plus Campaign. Thanks, for your support. I know there are numerous activities scheduled throughout the month. Please let your communities and us know about them. Have Fun!

My dear fellow Rotarians,

Once again, our Rotary family and neighbors have been stricken by a natural disaster. As specific needs develop within our zone, we will communicate that information to you. You can also review the relief information that is posted on The Disaster Network of Assistance Rotary Action Group (DNA RAG) website.

I also want to bring to your attention a message from adjoining zones 33-34 that Director Patrick Eakes communicated. Please take the time to review and support. We are not quite three months into the 2024-25 Rotary year, and a second devastating hurricane has caused widespread serious damage and loss of life in several of our districts, including those in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina. The damage is massive and ongoing, and more than 60 people have lost their lives so far.

Our Communications Action Plan team has updated the disaster relief page https://www.rizones33-34.org/ disaster-relief/> on our zones' 33-34 website to include a donation link to support recovery efforts. This is the same page that we used for Hurricane Beryl. However, this time, we are directing donations to a bank account owned by our zones. Our Zones are recognized as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit, which means that we operate as a recognized charity.

The eight districts in Florida have worked together effectively to address needs following two hurricanes in the last two years, and they have provided a powerful model that can be a starting point for us. Our plan is to collect donations through our website and assemble a team of experienced Rotary leaders to make recommendations about how to disperse the donations to create the maximum positive effect. We will also rely on Rotary leaders in the affected districts to determine the highest priorities in their areas and how to address them. Together, we will work to address as many needs as possible.

I encourage you to consider directing Rotarians, Rotary and Rotaract Clubs, and friends of Rotary to our disaster relief page https://www.rizones33-34.org/disaster-relief/. I have already done the same with an RI Director-Elect who inquired what his districts and clubs can do to support us.

I expect to have additional information for you in the coming days. Until then, I send my prayers to all of you whose districts have been affected by this storm.

October 24TH is <u>World Polio Day</u>, a day when Rotarians, public health advocates, and supporters focus on raising awareness and resources for the worldwide effort to eradicate polio.

Rotary began this fight in 1979 with a project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines. This successful project inspired Rotary leaders to make polio eradication a top priority. In 1985, Rotary launched the PolioPlus program, the first and largest internationally coordinated private-sector support of a public health initiative. It aimed to provide polio vaccines to children worldwide and support the infrastructure needed for immunization campaigns.

In 1988, Rotary became a founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), alongside the World Health Organization (WHO), the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and UNICEF. In 2007, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation agreed to match Rotary's contribution and increased its match to \$2-to-\$1 in 2013.

Rotary and its partners have immunized more than 2.5 billion children against polio in 122 countries. As a result of these efforts, polio cases have been reduced by 99.9%. Many feel

we would have completed the job except for civil unrest, political instability, and logistical difficulties in Afghanistan and Pakistan that have made immunization efforts difficult and dangerous.

Rotary's contributions have included more than \$2.1 billion in funding and countless volunteer hours. Rotary's advocacy efforts, crucial in securing political and financial support, have successfully lobbied governments to contribute over \$10 billion



to the cause. Total contributions to the effort have exceeded \$12 billion.

Through continued financial support, advocacy, and hands-on involvement, Rotary has demonstrated the impact of global cooperation and community action in tackling one of the world's most persistent public health challenges. The journey to eradicate polio is a testament to the power of global cooperation and sustained public health efforts.
